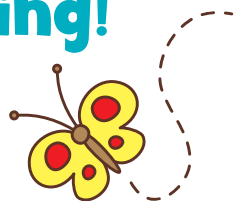

Low cost, fun, play ideas - perfect for early learning!

Children learn more in the first 5 years of life than they do in the rest of it.



They learn to control their bodies, to walk and to talk just by watching, listening and exploring.

A child's first teacher is the person who looks after them the most; mum, dad, grandparents, etc.

Research on what helps children succeed as adults shows that playing with your child is the most important ingredient. The time you spend is more important than the type of toys and how expensive they are.

Raiding your recycling bin and that drawer with bits and bobs everyone seems to have, will give you plenty of things to use for fun activities.

To help you get started we've come up with a few easy ideas for you to try.



Shaky bottles

You will need:

- Empty, clean bottles with lids
- Bits and bobs from around your house



- 1 Fill your bottles with 'noisy' items from around the house, e.g. rice, dry pasta, pebbles, beads.



- 2 Make sure that the lids are on really tight (you can glue them down to be extra safe).



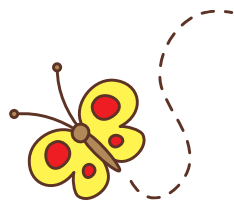
Then don't forget to shake!



Treasure baskets

You will need:

- A container
- Household items



1 Empty your container.



2 Find items from around the house.



3 Put them in your container.



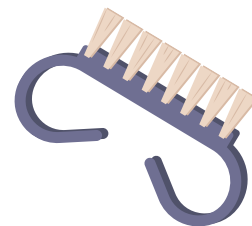
Be careful not to include anything:

- small enough to be swallowed
- pointy
- breakable (like glass)
- sharp



Ideas for your treasure basket:

- Jar lids (washed)
- Bangles and bracelets
- Nail brush
- Cloths
- Spoons
- Plastic or tin cups (for camping)
- Curtain tie backs
- Wood or plastic egg cups
- Metal or plastic bowls
- Shower crunchy
- Socks
- Bits of material
- Curlers
- Loofah



Mix it up a bit:

Colour

Everything in the basket is red or blue.

Noisy

Everything in the basket makes a noise.

Found

Things you have found out and about, like feathers, stones and pine cones (brilliant for toddlers and older children).



Sensory socks

You will need:

- Socks (sad, lonely, odd socks are perfect)
- Bits and bobs from around your house



- 1 Fill the sock with objects from around the house, e.g. plastic bottle tops, marbles, pegs, dried lavender, scrunched up greaseproof paper, bells, anything that is interesting to feel, smell or hear.



- 2 Either sew up the top of the socks or tie them in a knot so your child can't get to the contents.



Posting box

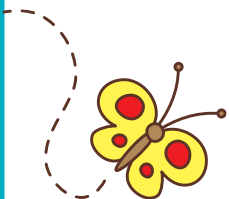
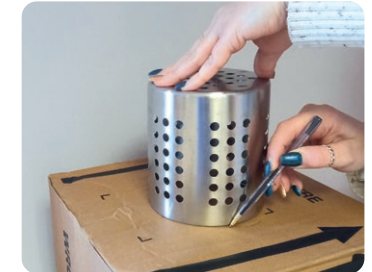


You will need:

- A box
- Scissors
- Pen
- Something round
- Bits and bobs from around your house



- 1 Draw a circle on top of the box. Cut a big hole in the top of the box.
- 2 Find objects, any shape, that are small enough to fit through the holes. These could be small balls, building blocks, cars, small dolls, spoons, nail brush, etc...



Squishy bags

You will need:

- Zip lock bags
- Hair gel, baby oil or water
- Glitter, sequins
- Food colouring (if you have it)
- Sticky tape



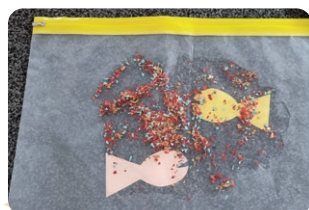
1 Carefully half-fill your zip lock bag with hair gel, baby oil or water. (If you are using food colouring add and mix it up).



2 Add some small objects or sequins.



3 Use a little sticky tape to put over the zip to avoid it being opened accidentally.



Always watch your baby doesn't cover their face with the ziplock bag.

Pulling box

You will need:

- An empty box
- Ribbons, string, wool, etc.
- A bell (optional)
- A pair of scissors



1 Using the scissors carefully poke some holes in the front and back of the box.



2 Drop the bell in the box (if you have one).



3 Tie a knot in one end of the ribbon.



4 Thread through the front and back of your box and then tie a knot in the other end.



5 Repeat until all your holes have ribbon going through them. Close the lid.



Play dough

You will need:

- 2 teaspoons cream of tartar
- 1 cup plain flour
- ½ cup salt
- 1 tablespoon oil
- 1 cup water
- Few drops of food colouring*
- Few drops of essence for a lovely smell*

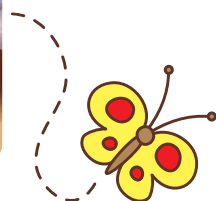


- 2 Mix everything together and knead for 3-4 minutes.

You are now ready to play.



- 1 Put all the ingredients into a bowl, mix together well.



If you store your play dough in an airtight container it will last for weeks.

** Food colour and essence are optional.*



Sorting games

Sorting games are easy to do at home and don't cost anything. Below are some simple ideas:



Sort out the washing into different colours.

Which colour do you like best?

Sort from small to big



Sort rough and smooth things

Sort hard and soft



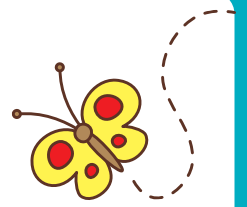
Sort into boxes, cake tins, bags



Scrap books

You will need:

- Pictures or photos
- 2 Sheets of paper
- Glue



1 Fold the paper in half.



2 Glue a line on the fold of one sheet of paper.



3 Stick this sheet to the other sheet.



4 Glue pictures or photos to each page in your book.



5 Your book is complete.
Talk about the pictures together.

Water

You will need:

- Washing up bowl
- Empty washing liquid bottle
- Jug
- Paint brush
- Bubble bath



- 1 Fill empty bottle with water.



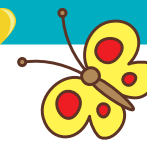
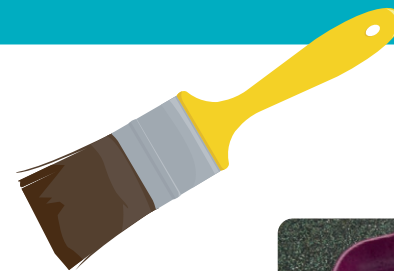
- 2 Squirt out the water to make pictures and patterns.



- 3 Put some water in the washing up bowl with the paint brush.



- 4 Paint some pictures.



- 5 Fill the washing up bowl with water.

Pour water from the jug to the bowl (pour it through a colander, from mug to jug, etc.)



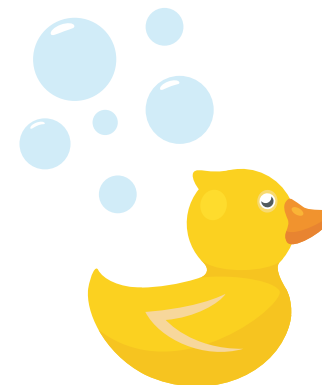
- 6 Keep the washing up bowl and get some bubble bath and a doll.

Add a few drops of the bubble bath to the water and swirl around.

Bath the doll!



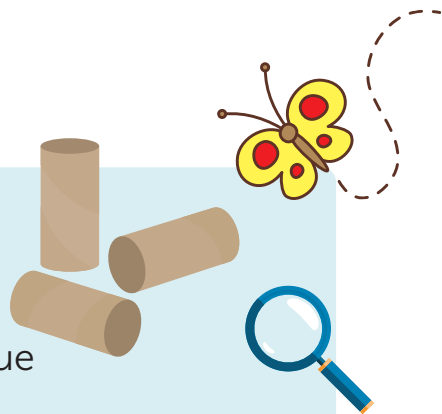
Never leave your little one alone when playing with water.



Box building

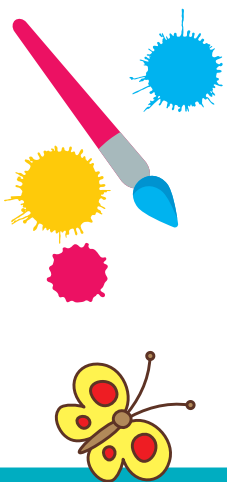
You will need:

- Empty boxes
 - Tubes
 - Masking tape, sellotape or glue
 - Empty bottles
- (You can raid your recycling bin but be careful not to use cans as these can have sharp edges)

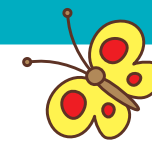


Ideas:

- 1 Build towers with your boxes and tubes.
- 2 Stick them together with glue or sellotape.
- 3 Paint them.
- 4 Stack them and roll a ball to knock them over.
- 5 Break a box up and draw a road on it.



I spy



You don't need anything to play this game. It will help to keep your child entertained on journeys, walking into town, waiting for appointments.

Rules:

One person looks around for something that catches their eye eg a tree. They say "I spy with my little eye, something that is green".

Everyone else takes a turn guessing what it is. The one who guesses correctly spies the next time.

You can spy colours, shapes, sizes and the sounds of the beginning of the words. Anything will work.

Share a book

Just looking at the pictures and saying what's on the page will give hours of cozy fun for you and your little one. It's free to join the library, where you'll find lots of great books and it makes a great trip out.
